



Overall response to the *Field Guide for Oil Spill Response in Arctic Waters* has been excellent. It has received positive reviews in the World Wildlife Fund's Arctic Bulletin, the ARCUS newsletter Witness the Arctic, and the Spill Science and Technology Bulletin. 1000 copies of the Field Guide were distributed worldwide to governments, oil companies, academics, libraries, and oil spill cleanup contractors.



The *First Responders Guide* is available in **Inuktitut**, **French**, and **English**, and is used as a training and response reference by Canadian Coast Guard, Department of National Defence and their contractors, and northern Colleges.



Parts of the *Field Guide* are available in **Swedish**. The Guide is used by the Swedish Coast Guard and the Rescue Services Agency, and forms the basis for contingency plans dealing with response to oil spills in winter conditions at sea and on beaches.



The *Field Guide* was distributed to the Bureau of Minerals and Petroleum, the Greenland Kommando, the Greenland Directorate for Environment and Nature, and the Danish Maritime Authority in Nuuk. The Guide was also sent to companies drilling wells off West Greenland.



The *Field Guide* is used as a standard by National and Regional Strike Teams, Marine Safety Officers, and industry groups throughout the country. It has also been distributed to response agencies in South America and Russia and at conferences such as the International Oil and Ice Workshop in Alaska.



Parts of the *Field Guide* are available in **Finnish**. The Guide was distributed to all Baltic countries not involved in the Arctic Council (Estonia, Lithuania, Latvia, Poland and Germany). It was also distributed to local response authorities in Finland.



The *Field Guide* is used in its current format.



The *Field Guide* was distributed to universities, government agencies, oil companies and individuals for use as a lexica to explain processes. The Guide is used widely for instruction at the University of Svalbard.



The *Field Guide* is available in **Russian**. The translated Guide is available from CNIF, Kavalergardskay str., 6, St. Petersburg, 193015, Russia.
