# **Information and Communication Technology in the Arctic**

## **An International Conference of the Arctic Council**

**Akureyri, Iceland, 20–21 October, 2003**

### **General information**

The Icelandic chairmanship of the Arctic Council is preparing an International Conference on Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in the Arctic: *Opportunities and Obstacles for Sustainable Development, Education and Telemedicine*.

#### **Aim**

The Arctic is a region characterized by small remote communities, long distances and general lack of effective infrastructure and communication. Information technology should be seen as an important means of addressing the economic, social and cultural circumstances that pertain to the Arctic. The aim of the conference should be to ask and discuss critical questions relating to the use of ICT, associated technical and social issues and benefits to Arctic residents. The conference is also invited to suggest collaborative actions among Arctic countries to promote ICT development based on best available practice.

#### **Participants**

The conference will bring together individuals of different backgrounds, policy makers, academics, people from business and industry and representatives of Arctic communities in order to improve the quality of life and contribute to healthy and vibrant communities in Northern rural areas. Many participants at the Arctic Council Senior Arctic Officials' meeting in Iceland, 23rd-24th October, 2003, are expected to attend.

#### **State of ICT in the Arctic**

The University of the Arctic will prepare a background paper on the state of technical affairs and ICT infrastructure in the Arctic, based on already published reports and strategies. The paper will be submitted to participants beforehand and placed on the conference web-page.

#### **Results**

The conclusions of the conference will be presented to the Senior Arctic Officials' meeting in October. All presentations will be made available on the Internet.

## **Program outline**

The conference will be organized into a plenary session in the morning of October 20th, two parallel workshop sessions in the afternoon and a round-table discussion on the 21st. The plenary session on the first day should provide an overview of the current status of ICT infrastructure in the Arctic and the challenges for building an Arctic ICT community that is comprehensive from the point of view of geographic reach and technological access. The role of an Arctic ICT system in creating a sustainable economy should also be examined and the importance of giving the rest of the world access to the North through an Arctic Information Highway. The two parallel workshops will examine distance education on the one hand and telemedicine on the other. They will focus on best practices in these fields, the need to build on what has been achieved and make appropriate recommendations for future collaborative actions. The conference will conclude with a round-table discussion in the morning of October 21st summarizing the discussions on the previous day and formulating its conclusions. Round table participants will be selected from among experts at the conference who have not given presentations in the workshops earlier.

### **20 October, 2003**

#### **Plenary Session 09:00-12:00**

This session will deal with the challenges ahead for building a comprehensive Arctic ICT community, for example in terms of technology, finances and geography.

#### **Parallel Session A: Distance education 13:30-17:00**

Themes included are for example: the University of the Arctic, the role of libraries in providing distance education and social and cultural aspects of distance education.

#### **Parallel Session B: Telemedicine 13:30-17:00**

Themes included are for example: health care for children and youth, telemedicine for general health care and maritime telemedicine.

### **21 October, 2003**

#### **Summary Session 09:00-12:00**

Reports from sessions, roundtable discussions and conclusions.

## **Venue**

The Conference will take place at the University of Akureyri, Oddfellow House in the town of Akureyri. Working language of the conference will be English with simultaneous translation into Russian. Akureyri, the host city, is the largest town outside Reykjavik and is situated in the fjord of Eyjafjordur. Akureyri is about a 5 hours drive or 45 minutes plane ride from Reykjavik, 4-6 flights are available between the two cities every day. Reservations for domestic flights in Iceland can be made on

With a population of 16,000, Akureyri is the center of trade, service, and education for Northern Iceland. ## **Practical information**

**Weather and clothing:** The weather in Iceland is very changeable and capricious. The average October temperature is 4,8 Celsius in Reykjavik and 3,8 Celsius in Akureyri. In addition coastal areas in Iceland tend to be windy. The most basic and

necessary clothing items, regardless of the time of year, are a sweater and water-and-wind resistant jacket. Swim wear should be brought along also regardless of the season; swimming is the Icelanders' favourite leisure and sport. Warm and comfortable open-air pools abound in Iceland.

**Banking:** The Icelandic monetary unit is the Krona (kr). Visitors can exchange currency at the Keflavik airport upon arrival and in banks in Akureyri. Autobank machines are also available. Banks are open from 9:00 to 16:00 during workdays.
